ABOUT “FRIENDLIES”

We are looking forward to welcoming members of the Midland, MI, Cincinnati, OH and Fort Wayne, IN curling clubs for 3 friendlies in March and early April.

Unlike a bonspiel in which individual teams compete in a round robin or tournament bracket format to determine a champion, a “friendly” is an inter-club competition where teams from each club compete to score cumulative points based on the outcome of each end and each game result.

We have a long-standing relationship with Fort Wayne dating from when we were both arena-based clubs. Initially we alternated hosting for the Hoosier Cup, emblematic of curling bragging rights for the State of Indiana, but for the last several years since they obtained dedicated ice the event has been held in Fort Wayne exclusively. We are excited to host the competition once again, now in our new dedicated facility.


Cincinnati moved to their dedicated ice facility a couple of years ago and our relationship with them is more recent. They hosted us last season and this year we look forward to returning the favor in what we hope will become an annual event competing for the “Seven Seas” trophy (CCCC vs CCC – get it?).

Geographic proximity helps explain our relationships with Fort Wayne and Cincinnati. Our ties with the Midland club may be a little less obvious. Midland has had dedicated ice since the early 1960’s. It is also where the global headquarters of Dow Chemical is located with that company’s former agricultural chemicals business (now Corteva) located in Indianapolis. One of our current and early members, Doug Pearson, was a member of the Midland club before transferring to Indy. Building on this tie the Midland club offered to host our intrepid band of arena curlers and so the “Pearson Cup” was born. For many years we have made the 6 hour drive to Midland and this year we are delighted to be able to host what, for us, is an historic event. Jim Puckering, our current club president, is also a former Midland member.

Over the years these three clubs have been very generous in providing us ice time, advice and other support and cheerleading our endeavors to obtain dedicated ice. We look forward to showing off the culmination of these efforts. Please join in giving these folks a warm Anderson welcome!

“Brush Up” On Your Rules

The Five Rock Rule



The five rock rule means that a stone cannot be removed from the “Free Guard Zone”, indicated by the gray area above, until after the fifth stone is played. If a stone is removed from play before such stones, the stone is placed back in its original position and the opponent’s stone is removed from play. In the image above, stones A through C are stones that cannot be removed until after the 5th rock has been thrown. Stone D can be removed because it is not in the Free Guard Zone.
